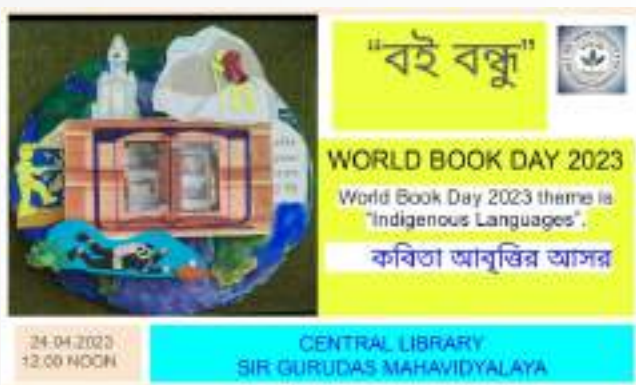

Deforestation is the reason behind overheating in nature and recently we face 42 degree Celsius.

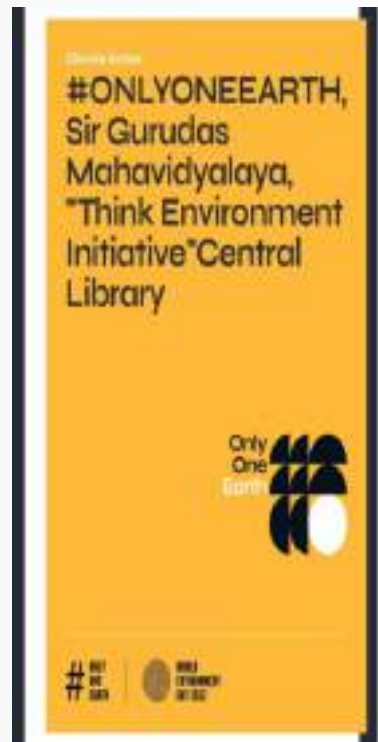

▶ Dictionary may be unabridged or abridged.

▶ Dictionaries which provide more than mere listing of the words of a language and their several meanings, may include historical development of words, usage slang, dialect and colloquialisms, synonyms and antonyms. Each can have separate dictionary. We know that quick reference books to deal with words are genuine



Dictionaries do not always call themselves dictionaries.

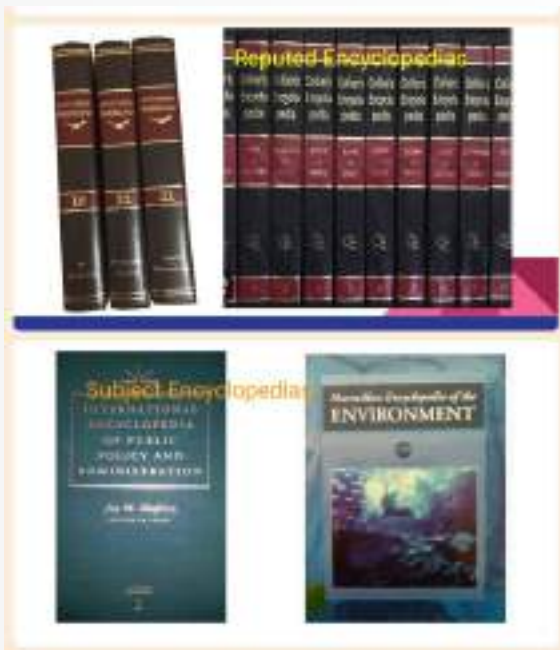
'wordbooks', or lexicons, glossaries or thesauri.

The term 'wordbook' is self-explanatory

The term 'lexicon' has come from a classical Greek word 'lexikon' meaning dictionary and is usually applied to dictionaries of ancient languages, such as 'A Greek-English lexicon' by Liddell and Scott

The term 'glossary' is commonly applied to the subject dictionary area.

The word thesaurus derives also from Greek thesauros meaning a storehouse or treasury. Modern usage is said to date from 1852 when Peter Mark Roget published the first edition of



The thesaurus of English words and phrases'. Roget thought of his thesaurus as a classification of ideas and subsequently has been used to describe dictionaries which arrange words in a classified order and not in the usually alphabetical one. Roget's Thesaurus was the progenitor of a whole range of thesauri and synonym dictionaries on various plans, topical or alphabetical showing varying degrees of grouping and relational structure, a variety of interpretations of synonyms and com covering simple listings and full discussions and so on.

The primary purpose of a dictionary

(1) Part of the language included-slang, dialect, technical words etc. (2) the period covered by the language (3) grammatical use, if any (4) spelling of plurals, verb, tenses and participles (5) syllabication (6) Definition, if given in order of historical or current usage (7) etymology (8) illustrative material-questions, maps, pictures, charts, if used, whether adequate, or appropriate (9) synonyms and antonyms, if any or are they explained (10) abbreviations and symbols, if explained (11) is encyclopaedic information, i.e. biography, geographical and historical facts included (12) is the dictionary easy to use? (13) comparison with other dictionaries on each of these points.

ENCYCLOPAEDIA ▶ In information sources encyclopaedia is the most revered reference book. Encompass all that is worth knowing. ▶

One or Multivolume ▶ Compendiums of information on all subjects. ▶ The encyclopaedias is to 'capsulize' and 'organize' the accumulated world of information and knowledge. ▶ World of knowledge is arranged alphabetically as articles. ▶ Any good encyclopaedia is expected to response

questions of any kind except the happenings of immediate past or political issues

ফেইসবুক পোস্টেই অর্থ উপার্জন করতে পারবেন

ফেইসবুক দেওয়া পোস্ট থেকে হয়ত অর্থ উপার্জন করতে পারবেন বিশ্বের সবচেয়ে বড় এই সামাজিক মাধ্যমটির ব্যবহারকারীরা। নতুন কিছু টুলস সংযোজন করার কথা ভাবছে ফেইসবুক, যা সাধারণ ব্যবহারকারীদের অর্থ উপার্জনের বেশ কিছু পথ বের করে দেবে। সম্প্রতি ফেইসবুক, অর্থ উপার্জনের পছন্দের প্রক্রিয়া সম্পর্কে জানতে চেয়ে কিছু ব্যবহারকারীর কাছে একটি সমীক্ষা পাঠায়। একজন ভেরিফাইড ফেইসবুক ব্যবহারকারীর পেইজে এই জরিপের প্রশ্নগুলি দেখা যায় বলে এক প্রতিবেদনে জানিয়েছে মার্কিন সংবাদ সাইট। কিন্তু সমস্যাটি শুধু এমন ভেরিফাইড পেজগুলোতেই পাঠানো হয়েছে নাকি আরও বিস্তৃতভাবে পাঠানো হয়েছে তা স্পষ্ট নয়।

জরিপের অংশ হিসাবে ‘ভার্চুয়াল টিপ জার’ নামের একটি অপশন যোগ করা হয়েছে, যা দিয়ে ভক্তরা ওই ব্যবহারকারীদের অনুদান দিতে পারবেন। এতে করে ওই ব্যবহারকারীরা তাদের ব্যান্ডেড কন্টেন্ট দিয়ে অর্থ উপার্জন করতে পারবেন। এটি ভক্তদের জন্য সেই ইউজারদের পছন্দের তহবিলে অনুদান দিয়ে তাদের অবদান রাখার উপায় হিসাবে কাজ করবে। সেই সঙ্গে ‘কল টু অ্যাকশন’ ধরনের একটি অপশনও রাখা হয়েছে। টাইম ম্যাগাজিন কে পাঠানো এক ইমেইলে ফেসবুকের একজন মুখপাত্র বলেছেন ‘এটা কেবল শুরু হল, আমরা আমাদের অংশীদারদের জন্য স্থিতিশীল, দীর্ঘমেয়াদী অর্থনৈতিক মডেল সৃষ্টির জন্য অঙ্গীকারবদ্ধ এবং আমরা এ নিয়ে তাদের প্রতিক্রিয়া গ্রহণ করছি। ফেসবুক এখনও এই মাধ্যমটিতে গেস্ট থেকে সাধারণ ব্যবহারকারীদের জন্য অর্থ উপার্জনের পথ খুলে দেয়নি ; যদিও ত্রুটি ব্যবহারকারীদের ‘ফেসবুক মেসেঞ্জার’ এর মাধ্যমে অর্থ অন্যান্য সদস্যদের পাঠানোর অনুমতি দেয়। প্রতিষ্ঠানটি প্রকাশকদের জন্য ইনস্ট্যান্ট আর্টিকেল এ – অর্থ উপার্জন করার উপায় হিসাবে এই সব পোস্টে ভিডিও বিজ্ঞাপন সংযোজন করার নতুন একটি নতুন অপসন চালু করেছে। চলতি বছরে মার্চে ব্যবসা বাণিজ্যে বিষয়ক মার্কিন দৈনিক ওয়াল স্ট্রিট জার্নাল প্রথম প্রতিবেদন প্রকাশ করে।

ফেসবুক সম্প্রতি প্রকাশক আর ভেরিফাইড ব্যবহারকারীদের স্পনসরদের সঙ্গে কাজ করার সুবিধার জন্য ব্যান্ডেড বিষয়বস্তুর নীতিতে পরিবর্তন এনেছে, যার মাধ্যমে আরও বেশি অর্থ উপার্জনের সুযোগ সৃষ্টি হবে।

ফেসবুক এই সুবিধাগুলি সাধারণ ব্যবহারকারীদের জন্য চালু করার কোন পরিকল্পনা করছে কিনা তা এই জরিপের মাধ্যমে **নাথি** হয় না। তবে প্রতিষ্ঠানটি যে এমন কিছু নিয়ে ভাবছে, সেদিকেই ইঙ্গিত করে।

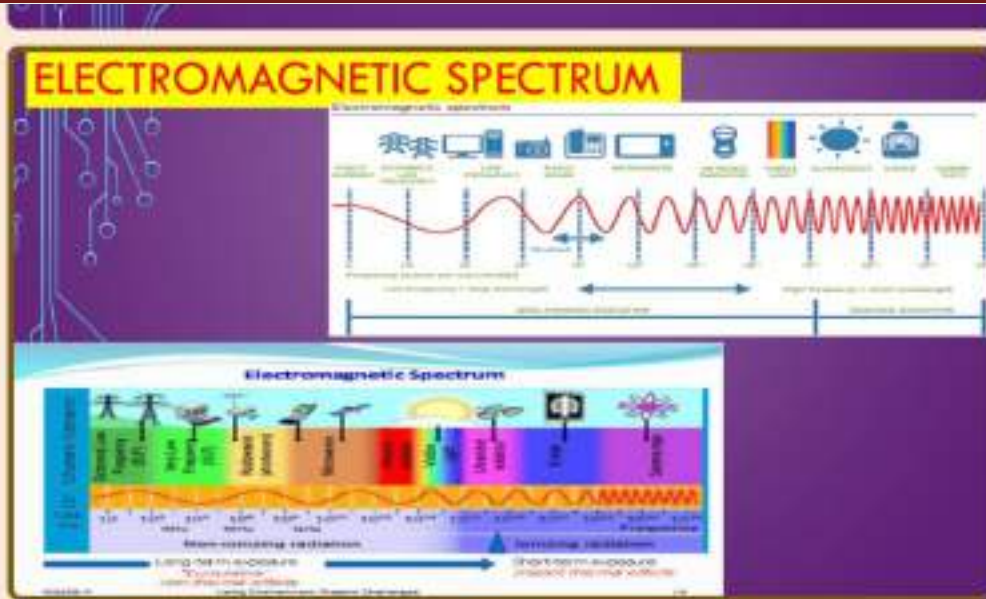
